- library staff can source materials from any of the 33 council libraries




#### Carina Police Station Visit 11 February 2019

Sen Sgt Brendan Jorgensen from Carina Police visited the shed to talk about the things you can do to improve your home security and safety:

- External doors should be solid and fitted with deadlocks
- Install a door viewer to see the person before you open door
- Do not leave keys in widow locks as intruders will break the glass to unlock your windows
- Ensure trees and shrubs are trimmed to allow visibility
- Secure garden tools and ladders
- Install security lighting and sensor lights
- Install smoke detectors and have a fire escape plan.



He was none of your dolts -he had seen them brand colts. And it seemed to his small understanding, If the man in the frock made him one of the flock, It must mean something very like branding.

Like a young native dog he ran into a log, And his father with language uncivil, Never heeding the "praste", cried aloud in his haste "Come out and be christened, you divil!"
But he lay there as snug as a bug in a rug, And his parents in vain might reprove him, Till his reverence spoke (he was fond of a joke) "I've a notion," says he, "that'll move him.
"Poke a stick up the log, give the spaleen a prog; Poke him aisy-don't hurt him or maim him; 'Tis not long that he'll stand, I've the water at hand, As he rushes out this end I'll name him.
"Here he comes, and for shame! ye've forgotten the name- Is it Patsy or Michael or Dinnis?" Here the youngster ran out, and the priest gave a shout- "Take your chance, anyhow, wid 'Maginnis!' "
As the howling young cub ran away to the scrub Where he knew that pursuit would be risky, The priest, as he fled, flung a flask at his head That was labelled "Maginnis's Whisky"!

## Diary of a War Baby

Shed member Peter Finch has kindly provided me with a copy of his self-published life story titled "Diary of a War Baby". As Peter was born in England in 1940, this book provides first-hand experience of growing up in war time and the post war shortages. It also highlights his experiences in Australia after he migrated to Australia with his newly-wed wife in 1963. I will provide a few extracts over the next few issues.



#### Preface

I am writing this for several reasons, and to leave something of my life behind.

When my brother Alan, cousins Chris and Grieg started researching our family trees, we all realised we should have done this whilst more of our parents, aunts & uncles were still alive.

Then there are the times I have visited England with my three daughter's. My cousins children, at least when they were all younger, seemed to me to look at them as if they were from another planet, I know some of you would say we are!!.

Lastly I have a need to put in writing my life, the life of a war baby as my generation has been overlooked by the interest in "baby boomers" a much exaggerated group of people

I started my life in a war, was bombed, evacuated to Aylesbury early 1944, moved to Glasgow early 1946 and in1963 was a £10 pom, that's what Aussies called us migrants.

My dad Walter Charles Finch was born on the 9<sup>th</sup> October 1915 at Laindon Essex. My mum Joan Patricia Finch (nee Newby) was born on the 19<sup>th</sup> October 1915 at Highgate Islington London.

They were born in the middle of World War 1, and whilst generations were not given generational names then, they were war babies as well. They were married on the 31<sup>st</sup> July 1938 in Ashingdon Church.

Whilst I remembered many things from my early life often these are specific events or things I did, just before I migrated to Australia Mum filled in some of the gaps, but in this book I have recorded them as I remembered them with Mum's explanation not shown separately.

If you do not know about any historical events I suggest you look them up on the web.



> 'What, are you nuts? Didn't you hear what I said?' 'Kiss me, and I will be your beautiful bride.'


He opened his pocket, looked at the frog and said, 'Nah. At my age, I'd rather have a talking frog.'
